FESTIVAL CELEBRATES 31ST ANNIVERSARY WITH HORSES AND ARTS FOR ALL AGES

More than 50 groups will help kids of all ages paint, sculpt, dance, sing and celebrate horses, 12-4 p.m. Saturday, June 7. The downtown festival encompasses Jay Street, the area around City Hall, and the Jay Square gathering place at 104 Jay St.

For the 31st anniversary of this family favorite, organizers decided to celebrate equines in several special ways, noting that the Belmont Stakes Racing Festival is happening in Saratoga on the same weekend. "People can help collage a life-size horse, create horsehead ornaments, paint a mural or even engage in some horseplay with the YMCA," said Betsy Sandberg, chair of the Kids Arts Festival planning committee. "We'll be horsing around with new activities."

A new photo selfie station celebrates the bicentennial of the Erie Canal, with artist Bianca DiLella. "The Mule Named Sal" is a community-based participatory project, facilitated by DiLella and brought to the festival with the support of miSci, which will incorporate the artwork into other community events later in the year.

- Learn how to play an electric guitar with Alec, Michael and Raya from the Be the Best you Can Band.
- Create butterflies and dragonflies with Cornell Cooperative Extension.
- Learn how to drum with Zorkie Nelson and members of the Pan African Youth Orchestra.
- Create their own pin-back button at Bear + Bird Boutique.
- Learn about colonial crafts with the Schenectady County Historical Society and make a whirligig to take home.

In the Jay Square gathering space, imaginative performers and student groups are booked to entertain the crowd. The Oneida Middle School Guitar Club will open with a concert at 12 p.m. followed by a short performance by dancers from Myers Ballet School. Myers hosts an open house at their 418 Liberty Street site from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. Other groups at Jay Square include Zorkie Nelson and members of the Pan African Youth Orchestra, performing several songs from their repertoire; dancers from Narthanala School of the Arts; circus artist Benjamin Domask-Ruh; and Hamilton Hill Arts Center youth showcasing clothing

they designed or adorned.

Chris Thomas and the Ongwe'hon:wehkah Dancers provide the finale to the day, performing Haudenosaunee social dances. These dances, such as the round dance, rabbit dance, old moccasin dance and canoe or fishing dance, honor the traditions and culture of the Haudenosaunee.
